# Proposed Wellbeing and Sustainable Development (Scotland) Bill

## Introduction

A proposal for a Member's Bill to ensure policy development and implementation by public bodies is in line with principles of sustainable development and wellbeing by introducing a duty for public bodies to promote these principles and establishing a Commissioner for sustainable development and wellbeing.

The consultation runs from 14 December 2022 to 24 March 2023

Development of the Bill is a political choice. The purpose of my response to this consultation is not to provide a political view but rather to raise some important questions which, I feel, warrant further discussion.

Q2. Do you think legislation is required, or are there other ways in which the proposed Bill's aims could be achieved more effectively? Please explain the reasons for your response.

One important point here, which has been noted in the draft proposal and supporting documents developed by SIDA is that there are quite a few pieces of legislation and policies that refer to wellbeing and / or sustainable development already. The challenge seems to be in implementing the current commitments to sustainable development. It is unclear how this new legislation would help to deliver more sustainable development.

Sustainable development has been defined numerous times in legislation. Again it is unclear how definitional debates can further progress towards meeting sustainable development goals.

It is unclear how having a sustainable development commissioner would enhance the achievement of sustainable development goals. It is worth noting that there was a sustainable development commission in the UK Government prior to 2011. Why is there no reference to this in the proposal or supporting evidence

provided by SIDA? The report of the UK Government Environmental Audit Committee raised a number of issues with the SDC at that time and ultimately it was agreed that Sustainable Development would be more effectively pursued from within government, from the centre of Government by a minister and department. Why is this approach not being adopted now in Scotland? Is there a risk that we repeat the mistakes of the UK Government from over 10 years ago without learning the lessons from their experience?

Q6. What, in your view, should the title of the proposed Commissioner be?

I don't see how the title of a commissioner will have a direct impact on the delivery of public services or of sustainable development and wellbeing more broadly.

Sustainable development and wellbeing approaches to government are not new. The UK Government, and devolved governments across the UK, have already signed up to many international agreements including most recently the UN Sustainable Development Goals, the 2015 Paris Agreement and of course the pledges made at COP26 in Glasgow. It is unclear how or what any new legislation around sustainable development would add to these existing commitments. There is no gap in legislation but there does seem to be a gap in implementation. It is worth noting that the proposal makes several references to the public sector yet the public sector make up a relatively small proportion of the economy and that many public services are delivered either solely by other sectors of the economy or in partnership with them (third sector and private sector). There is really no public service that is solely delivered by the public sector - so why only focus on sustainable development in the public sector? Is there a wider role to play in other aspects of policy or in procurement in relation to sustainable development? It is also worth noting that the SIDA report highlights the importance of policy coherence - how does the new sustainable development and wellbeing bill represent coherence with the legislation that is being developed within the UK Government and should any Scottish bill be delayed so that policy coherence can be assured?

# **Financial Implications**

It is unclear what, if any, power a commissioner outside of government would have and therefore how much influence they would have on individuals, businesses, the public sector, or others. In terms of the Bill more broadly the focus seems to be on public sector (though this has not been defined - would it include ALEOs for example) and so again it is unclear what impact (if any) it would have. At the same time there

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would obviously be a cost in terms of salary for a commissioner, office space, administrative support and general expenses. The costs associated with the Welsh Future Generations Commissioner (seemingly a model for this Bill) was £1.5m in 2021/22.

# **Sustainability**

This remains unclear particularly as so many public services and wider parts of the economy are not within the scope of the public sector. What is it about current commitments, policies and legislation in relation to protecting and enhancing the environment, achieving a sustainable economy, and creating a strong, healthy, and just society that has not worked and that this Bill would rectify?

### General

Q11. Do you have any other additional comments or suggestions on the proposed Bill (which have not already been covered in any of your responses to earlier questions)?

There seems to be a lack of consideration of previous attempts at developing wellbeing approaches to government or sustainable development either within the UK or internationally. Similarly there is a lack of consideration of current international frameworks for sustainability. The academic journal, Public Administration and Development (of which I am co-Editor-in-Chief), was the first public administration journal to publish on the sustainable development goals (in 2015) and there is a wealth of research on how governments across the world have attempted to develop more sustainable approaches to government. Similarly there are large international networks, particularly through the UN and International Institute of Administrative Sciences (IIAS) which have developed good practice in the area of sustainable

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development. The Public Administration Committee of the UK's Joint University Council (of which I am Honorary Chair) have worked closely with the IIAS in promoting sustainable approaches to government. Finally, my own research on the Scottish governments National Performance Framework has explored it's development as strategic approach to government (Elliott 2020) and more recently how a lack of focus and waning momentum created significant challenges in the practice of strategy (Elliott 2023). Again there are important lessons to be learned but instead of focusing on implementation the desire seems to be to build new policies, structures and systems in a style previously described as "initiative overload".
