Proposed Wellbeing and Sustainable Development (Scotland) Bill

Introduction

A proposal for a Member's Bill to ensure policy development and implementation by public bodies is in line with principles of sustainable development and wellbeing by introducing a duty for public bodies to promote these principles and establishing a Commissioner for sustainable development and wellbeing.

The consultation runs from 14 December 2022 to 24 March 2023

Q1. Which of the following best expresses your view of the proposed Bill? (Please note, that this question is compulsory.)

Fully supportive

Please explain the reasons for your response.

The Bill could provide an opportunity to strengthen commitments across government and public bodies in a more comprehensive and coherent manner. It could provide focus and processes for ensuring wellbeing and sustainable development underpin and inform policy decisions and implementation. This Bill could provide a framework to significantly reduce negative impacts on the lives and livelihoods of people across the globe including low-income countries. Much of Scotland's historic and current trading relations have contributed and continue to contribute to inequalities globally. The recognised commitment to being a Fair Trade Nation could be strengthened by this proposed legislation.

The proposed legislation could assist in setting objectives towards achieving the Sustainable Development Goals and the linked National Outcomes ensuring that doing so impacts positively on communities and people's wellbeing and the environment here in Scotland and globally.

Mechanisms and processes for ensuring that the aims of the Bill are in fact realised in action are essential. The proposed Bill's creation of an independent commission is central to this. An authoritative body with the ability to support public bodies, share best practice and guidance, collect data, and importantly monitor progress seems to us to be required.

Q2. Do you think legislation is required, or are there other ways in which the proposed Bill's aims could be achieved more effectively? Please explain the reasons for your response.

It is our view that legislation is required in order to establish the legal underpinning of the aims of the proposed Bill. The creation of legislation not only gives the necessary legal underpinning of the aims of the proposed Bill but also the existence of legislation can contribute to organisational, cultural and societal change. Legislation is a clear testament to the importance given to wellbeing and sustainable development.

Q3. Which of the following best expresses your view on whether 'sustainable development' should be defined in legislation?

Fully supportive

Please explain the reasons for your response, including any views on what the definition should include.

We believe that defining 'sustainable development' in the legislation is important. There are already references in legislation as well as government and public sector policies to 'sustainable development'. We believe that the proposed Bill offers an opportunity to provide clarity and therefore facilitate reporting and accountability. We support the definition of 'sustainable development' used by Scotland's International Development Alliance: "Sustainable Development can be defined as the development of human societies in ways which do not threaten planetary boundaries, and which equitably support the capability of present and future generations across the world to meet their needs."

The Forum has long supported a policy coherence for sustainable development approach. We would want to see this referenced and defined in the proposed Bill. Policy coherence for sustainable development must support ecological integrity and social equity within Scotland and support the self-defined sustainable development of other countries. Fundamentally, policy coherence for sustainable development should ensure that no policy undermines any other policy and where policy conflicts occur where policy conflicts occur, the root cause of the conflict should be identified and efforts made to resolve it in a manner which minimises trade-offs and maximises synergies. The commitment to being a Fair Trade Nation needs to be seen to shape coherently where relevant policies across government and public bodies.

Q4. Which of the following best expresses your view on whether 'wellbeing' should be defined in legislation?

Fully supportive

Please explain the reasons for your response, including any views on what the definition should include.

The Forum believes that similar to sustainable development, defining 'wellbeing' in the legislation is important. There are already references in legislation as well as government and public sector policies to 'wellbeing'. We believe that the proposed Bill offers an opportunity to provide clarity and therefore facilitate reporting and accountability.

We believe that wellbeing is the extent to which people are able to realise the social, economic, environmental and democratic outcomes that they seek. The definition of 'wellbeing' needs to take into account the inequalities in wellbeing between different groups, both domestically and globally, and the conditions for the collective wellbeing of future generations.

We also believe that the proposed legislation should include a definition of 'wellbeing economy' for similar reasons as for 'sustainable development' and 'wellbeing' - that is that it is a term often used by government and public bodies and having a definition in law offers an opportunity to provide clarity and therefore facilitate reporting and accountability. A commitment to Fair Trade helps contribute to responsible consumption and production. Such responsibility in business and trade needs to be central to the definition of the 'wellbeing economy'.

Q5. Which of the following best expresses your view on whether there should be a Commissioner for sustainable development and wellbeing?

We support the proposal of a new Commissioner to monitor implementation of the Bill, including the statutory duties, with a legal requirement for the commissioner to be both independent of government, and adequately resourced to support public bodies to deliver their duties within the Bill. We believe that independence from government and adequate resourcing are essential to provide the necessary status and capacity to ensure that a Commissioner can effectively carry out their role. It has become clear in our own research of public bodies and procurement that there is a wide range of understandings of Fair Trade being used by public bodies and a wider range of ways of recording Fair Trade public procurement. This makes monitoring difficult and clear comparisons impossible to make. A Commissioner as set out in the proposed legislation could provide the clarity necessary in this area and others to allow for far more effective monitoring and accountability.

We have no view on the particular title for the Commissioner. We believe the title should recognise the breadth and importance of the role.

The Forum would want the proposed Bill to strengthen the duties on public bodies to pursue sustainable development and wellbeing. The proposed Bill provides an opportunity to clarify existing duties on public bodies across a wide range of legislation. We do not see this as adding to a burden on public bodies but reducing a burden through greater clarity and coherence in approach that makes reporting easier. It will be vital that public bodies are given clear guidance, sufficient support and the necessary tools in order to implement duties but with this, we believe that it should be possible to improve delivery and effectiveness while not increasing the burden on public bodies.
