Proposed Wellbeing and Sustainable Development (Scotland) Bill

Introduction

A proposal for a Member's Bill to ensure policy development and implementation by public bodies is in line with principles of sustainable development and wellbeing by introducing a duty for public bodies to promote these principles and establishing a Commissioner for sustainable development and wellbeing.

The consultation runs from 14 December 2022 to 24 March 2023

Other approaches such as the National Performance Framework, the Community Empowerment Act and, more recently, the Wellbeing economy monitor are positive steps forward, but specific legislation will more meaningfully support and complement these, driving forward a more balanced approach to protecting our natural and social systems, ensuring than in fostering prosperity for all, we also stay within our planetary boundaries.

As a result of Glasgow's experience in localising UN SDGs and collaborating with local stakeholders to understand what a Thriving City would look like, it became apparent that a better horizontal and vertical integration of policies and governance both locally, regionally and nationally became apparent as a key prerequisite to achieve a Sustainable Place. It is important to create a common framework and language approach to enable public bodies such as local authorities to better and more effectively work with local organisations and communities, mobilising action and achieving the truly transformational action required to address the complex challenges facing our social, economic and environmental systems. A sustainable development and wellbeing Bill would be a welcome means to help with that integration and transformation.

Including sustainable development in legislation is necessary to translate commitments, such as the UN Sustainable Development Goals and other global or national development goals into reality.

It will provide a more detailed insight into what public bodies roles and responsibilities are, but also outlines a commitment to contributing to effective sustainable development locally, regionally and nationally. It will help highlight the need to increase focus on the key pillars and objectives of sustainable development, supporting accountability and transparency.

Glasgow City Council welcome the Bill as a fresh approach to sustainability and move away from Bruntland Comission's definition, building on the Global Goals to focus on human and climate factors. A societal move to a wellbeing economy to replenishing nature rather than extraction would be most welcome.

The Future Generations Commissioner in Wales and who is independent from the Parliament, has already showed that it can more effectively promote sustainable development and ensuring that future generations and their voices are represented. The nature of the requirement under any new duty will be critical. If it follows the Equality Duty and Climate Change duties in asking for due consideration; this would be a helpful and proportionate approach. However excessive requirements linked to a duty can often reduce the approach to reporting outcomes to a box ticking exercise; and stifle innovation.

In addition to this, the Public Bodies Duties on Climate Change already include consideration to ' acting Sustainably', it would be helpful to understand how existing duties will be integrated into a new sustainable development and wellbeing duty, without causing duplication or potentially overburdening public bodies, putting pressure on time and staff resources.

Furthermore, there may be additional initial costs to reimagining and redesigning services or approaches but this may be balanced by medium to long term benefits, including to nature and social capital.
